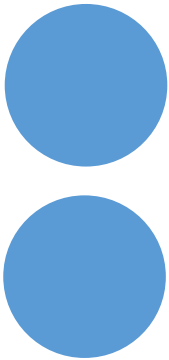

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Welcome to the CYBERUS Adventure!

We are very glad to welcome you on board the CYBERUS Erasmus Mundus master!

This student handbook contains all the information you need from your admission to your graduation. You can also find a lot of detailed information in the International student guides of the 3 universities available on our website: <https://master-cyberus.eu/news/downloads>

We do our best to keep this guide up-to-date but things change quickly! We will give a lot of other possible sources of information, don't hesitate to have a look at it!

1 Programme overview

The CYBERUS Erasmus Mundus Joint Master in cybersecurity, or CYBERUS, is a highly integrated two-year full-time master programme. It is taught in English. It offers 2 specialisation tracks leading to double master's degrees:

- IoT Cybersecurity (between UBS and ULB): security of digital objects/equipment, of their design and of their connections
- Software Cybersecurity (between UBS and UL): security of applications, systems and programming.

Students enrolled in the IoT Cybersecurity track receive a double master's degree from UBS and ULB while those registered in the Software Cybersecurity track receive a double master's degree from UBS and UL. A balance is targeted in the number of students in either specialisation.

The study plan is the following:

2 Administrative procedure

2.1 Admission and enrolment

The whole admission and enrolment procedure of the CYBERUS Master programme is coordinated by UBS. Therefore, students are registered at the admitting institution UBS for the whole time of their studies. Students could also be registered in ULB or UL depending their track from the 1st semester.

If accepted to the programme, you will receive by email an acceptance letter. This letter is considered official, as the French version is the only legally binding letter. This also means you will not receive a hard-copy of your admission letter via regular mail.

Once all your required documents (concerning e.g., university degree, English proof) are received at the UBS programme office and the semester fee is paid, you will be ready to be enrolled into the UBS as a student. Final enrolment will be effective during your first week in Lorient.

2.2 Tuition fees and scholarships

The annual registration fee is €4,500. It includes an International Health and Accident Insurance and it covers all compulsory academic activities but neither travel, food nor lodging.

CYBERUS has a policy of supporting the best students. If you are among the best ranked in the selection process, you may be offered a fee waiver and an Erasmus Mundus scholarship of €1,400/month for the whole 24 months of the programme or just a fee waiver.

2.3 Other fundings and sponsoring

In addition to the Erasmus Mundus scholarships, 3 types of scholarships exist for international students:

- French government scholarships: these scholarships are awarded only by the cultural and cooperation services of French embassies abroad, consult the French Embassy website of your country
- Scholarships awarded by the government of the student's home country for study abroad; for more information, please contact the scholarship body in your home country
- International scholarships granted by non-governmental organisations (NGOs) or international institutions.

The site [Campus France](#) is a comprehensive directory of scholarship programmes for internationally mobile students. Beware: the application process is long and the application deadlines are very strict!

2.4 Health insurance coverage

CYBERUS will provide selected students with an International Health and Accident Insurance. It covers:

- Health Care (Hospitalisation, Treatment costs following accident or illness, Dental treatment costs)
- Assistance to persons (Repatriation / evacuation, Legal assistance, Travel and accommodation expenses for family members, Theft and loss of identification documents and travel tickets)
- Accident (Permanent disability, Death), Civil liability / private life (Physical damage, Material damage)
- Baggage (Purchase of articles of immediate necessity, Special and valuable items) and Household furniture.

The insurance will not cover pre-existing medical problems.

For visits to a general practitioner, students may expect to pay the doctor's bill and then be refunded by the insurance after filling a claim.

2.5 Visa and residence permit

For general information about visas for France visit the official [France Visa](#) or [Campus France](#) website.

Students who hold European citizenship or are from the European Economic Area (Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway), or Swiss students with Swiss citizenship **do not need a student visa**.

Non-European students from an “**Etudes en France**” country listed [here](#) must follow the guidelines of the Campus France Office from their home country.

Non-European students who are NOT from an “**Etudes en France**” country must first apply online for a Long-Stay Visa (Visa VLS-TS) and then ask for an appointment at the French consular authorities in their home country.

For this programme, you have to apply for a Long-stay study visa (VLS-TS) and ask for “Etudiant en programme de mobilité” (student – mobility)

For the visa application, you will need the essential documents below:

- Passport: issued in the last 10 years. Valid for at least three months after the planned date of departure from France.
- Recent ID pictures in OACI format (pdf)
- Application form [Cerfa 14571*05](#) <https://france-visas.gouv.fr/en/web/france-visas/forms>
- Original copy of your last diploma
- Letter of acceptance from UBS

- Proof of accommodation for the first three months in France
- CYBERUS grant certificate
- Proof of financial guarantee: When you apply for your VLS-TS visa, you will have to prove your financial guarantee, that is to say a minimum of 615 € per month of stay in France.

For EMJM Scholarship students: scholarship certificate proving you will receive an EMJM scholarship of 1400 € per month.

For Non-Scholarship students: Original bank statements of the last 3 months belonging to you or your sponsor and/or Working certificate mentioning your salary or sponsor's salary/means of income.

In case you don't have own resources, a notarized financial guarantee form (or a cover letter) completed and signed by your sponsor, a copy of his passport data page or a valid national ID.

Or a Scholarship certificate from your government or a private company.

Acceptance or refusal of a visa is totally at the discretion of the French consular services.

Validate your VISA once you are in France:

Within 3 months of arrival in France, you must validate your VLS-TS and pay a fee in addition to the visa fee. (50 € to be paid when validating your long-stay visa as a residence permit).

The online procedure allows you to be a legal resident: the situation of a foreigner in possession of documents authorising them to remain on French territory and to be able to cross the borders of the Schengen area again.

The Digital Administration for Foreigners in France (ANEF) aims to digitise all procedures concerning foreigners in France: residence and access to French citizenship

The VLS-TS is issued for a period of 4 months to 1 year.

Etudes en France: EeF

The "Etudes en France" (*Studying in France*) procedure becomes the reference to access higher education in France. It only concerns 46 countries in the world. It is used by Campus France agencies, French HEI, French Consulates.

The [Etudes en France platform](#) is completely digitised and manages all of the enrolment procedures for an institute of higher education until the visa request.

Just create a private electronic file and follow the instructions:

- Apply for the "Simplified Procedure" as you have already been admitted
- You will indicate that you have been admitted under the Erasmus Mundus programme (EMJM)
- Scholarship holders should indicate that they are beneficiaries of an Erasmus Mundus scholarship
- You will need to upload all the required documents
- Make an appointment with your local Campus France Agency and follow the instructions.

Erasmus Mundus scholarship holders are exempted from EeF and visa fee payment.

If you do not live in one of these countries and you need a visa to study in France, please contact the Campus France Agency of your country of residence or apply directly on France Visa for your VLS-TS.

Campus France

Campus France promotes French higher education and offers information and assistance to students who want to continue their post-secondary studies in France. Campus France functions worldwide in 124 countries

2.6 Bank Account

All students should open a bank account when they arrive, as this is where financial assistance and grants might be credited. You should do so, even if you come only for three months, as this is where you will be reimbursed for your health expenditures or security accommodation rental deposit. If you work, it is where your salary will be paid into.

To open a bank account, you need a copy of your passport or identity card, a photocopy of your student card and a proof of residence.

3.1 Accommodation

There are plenty of student accommodation offers in Lorient, but more students! To find a pleasant place to live, it is better to anticipate! Be prepared so that you don't have to choose in a hurry, or find yourself faced with a poor-quality offer...

Never send money before you have seen the accommodation and/or the owner. Money transfers via cash transfer or Western Union should be avoided at all costs. In case of doubt, please contact us.

Temporary accommodation

Long-term accommodation

The price per month for an apartment is between 350€ (room in a shared apartment) and 600€ (Bedsit on your own).

CROUS (Student Residence)

Rooms at the student residence are reserved for French students with a scholarship from the French Government from low-income families, or foreign students with a scholarship offered by the French Embassy.

UBS enrolls many French Government Scholarship holders so there are no places available in the **CROUS student residence**.

You can also try to apply for a bedsit at **Espacil habitat** (<https://www.espacil-habitat.fr/devenir-locataire/etudiants/residences-etudiantes/residences-nina-pinta-et-santa-maria-a-orient/>) for example. Be careful, however, as it can take several weeks to process your application and may not always result in a positive response. The accommodation is not always furnished, or with the minimum (single bed, table, chair, cooker, fridge and cupboards).

NB: Do make sure that your first and last name appear on the rental agreement (“*bail*” or “*contrat de location*” in French) to be able to ask for financial assistance

Deposit, guarantor and charges

When you book an apartment, you will have to leave a deposit (called “*dépôt de garantie*” or “*caution*” in French) of 1 or 2 months' worth, which you will get back when leaving the apartment).

To rent an apartment, landlords will ask you to provide a guarantor. A guarantor (in French “*caution solidaire*” or “*garant*”) is the person who, in a written document called a “*guarantee deed*”, undertakes to pay the tenant's rental debts in case of default from the tenant. These include the rent and additional expenses, as well as any interest charged to the tenant for late payment of rental debts, and the costs of repairing damaged accommodation.

The guarantor can either be:

- an individual (a family member or a friend living in Europe)
- or a legal entity (Visale for instance)

If you do not have a guarantor, consult this website: www.visale.fr

As a European exchange student, you just need to provide proof of identity (i.e. a valid passport or ID card). If you are a non-European student, you need a valid visa and longterm residence permit. To benefit from Visale, you need to be under 30 or be 30 as a student. More information on: <https://www.campusfrance.org/en/VISALE-free-security-deposit-for-students>

In Lorient, you can expect to pay about 50€/100€ a month for utilities. This generally includes electricity, water, heating and garbage. Depending on your area, these prices may vary. It is usually included with the rent, it is called “charges”.

Insuring your accommodation

Owners will request a multi-risk house insurance policy. This is compulsory, regardless of your type of accommodation. It is a legal protection of the premises and for yourself, as it includes civil liability insurance.

CAF : APL (housing allowance)

International students benefit from the same financial assistance as French students. To benefit from this help, you must have a rental agreement in your name and not have any children. Non-European students also need a valid VLS-TS Long Stay Visa or a residence permit. Once you have a rental agreement in your name you have three months to apply online for financial assistance via the following website: www.caf.fr

This financial assistance is called *Aide Personnalisée au Logement* (APL - personal accommodation assistance)

TO APPLY FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE, YOU MUST

- 1- already have your accommodation and a rental contract
- 2- be able to provide your address and the rent amount
- 3- be registered with Social Security
- 4- have a French bank account in your name

Contact the landlord

You will have to contact the landlord, please note that they are probably non-English speaking, so translate your request into French. If you find an apartment and you are already in contact with the landlord, you can also send us the offer and we will help you to finalise your contract. Never send money before you have seen the accommodation and/or the landlord. Money transfers via cash transfers or Western Union should be avoided at all costs.

Please note that we can also help you do that once you are in France

3.2 Average monthly budget

General cost for the first month: **between 1500 and 2000 €**

« **Scholarship student** »: please note that you will need to provide for your needs for about a month before the scholarship is effectively paid into your bank account (First payment early October).

« **Non-scholarship student** »: you will need to provide for your needs during the 2 years studies.

3.3 Sport & Culture

More than 46 sports activities are offered by the Sports Department of Université Bretagne Sud. If you wish to discover or progress in an activity, the Sports Department will actively support you in your initiation or improvement in the physical activity of your choice. Go to your School secretary's office to buy the "PASS SPORT UBS" for 25€. The next day, you will have access to the online activity programme.

There are many private sports facilities Lorient, as well as a climbing gym, an ice rink, and a bowling alley. There are also two cinemas, a theatre and numerous libraries and media libraries.

3.4 Public transportation

Obtaining a public transport card in Lorient is quick and easy. All you have to do is go to the IZILO ticket office with a passport photo, your admission letter from the university and proof of address. Your card will be ready the same day.

3.5 Languages courses

CYBERUS students will need to speak two EU languages at least: the language of tuition, English, and French. While instruction and professional work are conducted in English as a common denominator, students will be actively engaged in French-speaking environments beyond their learning settings. It is expected that few will speak French initially. This is why all will have to take French in every taught semester, or another language if they already speak it. For other EU languages, CYBERUS students will enjoy the same offer as that to international students built along the same lines of level achievement at the end of each semester, of student progression, and of development of linguistic, communicational, and cultural skills. This will accompany the development of intercultural skills.

3.6 Winter School in TalTech – Estonia

An annual winter school is organised by TalTech in Estonia with lectures about threats and actors in cyberspace. This takes place in January.

Tallinn is the capital city of Estonia situated on the Baltic Sea. The official language is Estonian while Russian is also spoken by part of the population. English is spoken by a large part of the population. At

the forefront of cybersecurity, Tallinn hosts the NATO Cooperative Cyber Defence Centre of Excellence. It is home to more than 60 museums and galleries and the Black Nights Film Festival. More at <https://visittallinn.ee/eng>

4 Semester 3: Université Libre de Bruxelles / IoT Cybersecurity track

4.1 Immigration procedure

If your stay in Belgium will exceed 3 months, you need to apply for a residence permit. The residence permit is mandatory, even for EU citizens, and you must carry this with you at all times. The permit replaces the entry visa and enables you to travel in the Schengen zone and re-enter it (for example if you go home during the holidays).

Getting a residence permit (long stay)

Within the first 8 days after your arrival in Belgium, you need to register at the Foreigners' Desk at your local town hall. The registration procedure varies from one town hall to another; we therefore suggest you check their website before going. You will be requested to provide your ID card or passport as well as your ULB registration certificate. Be aware that in some cases, copies of birth and marriage certificates must be authenticated by the Belgian consulate and, if needed, translated by an official translator.

Within a few days after your visit to the town hall, a police officer will come round to check that you are indeed living at the address you have given. Please remember to put your name on your letterbox and/or doorbell. A few days after the police officer's visit, you will get an appointment to complete the registration process at the town hall, as well as a list of documents to bring along.

4.2 Accommodation

As the capital of Belgium, one can expect higher rent prices and more competition for rentals than elsewhere in Belgium. In Brussels' city centre, prices average around €850 to €950 per month for a two-bedroom apartment or €350 to €550 for one-student rental accommodation ("kot").

Most students live in private housing. The cost of sharing a private flat is around €350-€500 per person. The best way of finding accommodation is to look around when you actually get to Brussels. Also, please beware of fraud when researching an accommodation.

Temporary accommodation

We advise you to book a room in a hotel or a youth hostel, using this as a base for going out to look for rental ("À louer") accommodation near the University campus.

Long-term accommodation

If you are planning to spend several months or years at ULB, you will need to look for long-term accommodation. The rental market is fast-moving and there are many options available at various prices. The neighbourhoods most favoured by our students at the Solbosch and la Plaine campuses are Ixelles, Etterbeek, Auderghem, Saint Gilles and Bruxelles-Ville. If you want to check how conveniently-located an apartment is next to ULB, you can use the public transport website: **stib.be**

ULB Housing Office can support you in your search for suitable accommodation and advise you on many aspects of student housing. Their webpage lists a lot of accommodation offers, including university and private residences. If you want to find accommodation in a University Residence, you have to apply early (March).

Utility costs

In Brussels, you can expect to pay about €125 a month for utilities. This generally includes electricity, water, heating and garbage, for an apartment around 85 sqm. Depending on your area, these prices may vary, but not much. The monthly price for student accommodation often includes utility costs but be sure to check with your landlord beforehand.

4.3 Average monthly budget

Accommodation expenses will represent the biggest share of your budget. Your actual expenses will of course depend on your lifestyle. Although Brussels isn't the most expensive city in Europe like Paris, Luxembourg, London or Stockholm, it is still quite expensive to live here. It really depends on your rent, so choose wisely between comfort and cost. You'd fairly need **nearly €750-1060€ a month** to get by, counting rent, food and going out for food or drinks.

5.1 Immigration procedure

Resident permit

Since this study programme leads to double degree, the student is required to carry out part of their studies in Luxembourg. Therefore, if they hold a residence permit in another EU Member State, they must apply for a notification of mobility with the competent authorities in Luxembourg (Ministère des Affaires étrangères et européennes).

Registration in the Register of Titles

Once you have received the notification of mobility document sent by the Luxembourg Ministry of Foreign Affairs, you should apply for a Register of Titles which is the recognition of your Bachelor's degree by the Luxembourg authorities. This request is made to the Ministry of Higher Education and Research as explained above and under the following link:

Caution: The recognition of the Bachelor diploma must correspond at least to level 6 of the Luxembourg framework of qualifications. Otherwise we will not be able to finalise the registration of the candidate.

5.2 Accommodation

The University of Luxembourg manages halls of residence in the city of Luxembourg (8), in Esch-sur-Alzette (15), in Noertzange (1), in Mondercange (2), in Dudelange (2), in Belvaux (3) in Oberkorn (1) and in Niederkorn (1). Please note that these student accommodations are in very high demand and cannot fulfill the whole student community's housing needs. Different types of accommodation are available in the halls of residence.

On average, a month's rent for a bedsit in the city centre in Luxembourg is €1604. This price can go down to 1275 € and up to 2050 € depending on the period and the city. This rate for a one-room flat in the city centre is higher than the rate in France (by 121%).

The minimum cost of a room in a shared flat is usually €600 or more, but the average is about €1,000 per month.

5.3 Average monthly budget

Luxembourgers enjoy a high standard of living, which is reflected in a fairly high cost of living. Rents are high, but the price of everyday goods is comparable to that of other large European cities.

The average monthly budget for a student will range from €600 to over €1000 per month (excluding rent)
